




THE BIBLICAL AUTUMN FEAST DAYS 2024 (Calendar of God)



Note: The biblical Day of Trumpets (Yom Teruah, 1st Tishri) is on September 4/5, 2024, but in the Jewish calendar it is on October 2/3, 2024, so the Jewish year 5785 only begins on this day. The biblical Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur, 10th Tishri) is on September 13/14, 2024 in God's calendar. However, according to the Jewish calendar, the Day of Atonement is celebrated a whole month too late, on October 11/12, 2024. The priest would die if he entered the Holy of Holies in the Jerusalem Temple on this incorrect Yom Kippur. The last High Sabbath, Shemini Azeret, even falls at the end of the month of October in the Jewish calendar, which is completely impossible because the spring and autumn feast days must always fall in the area of the equinox (March 19-21 and September 22-24) and are always adjusted to the ripeness of the grain (barley) and fruit. Only the biblical calendar brings the moon and stars, nature, harvest times and feast days into a harmonious unity.


Note: The illustrations above show the biblical **feast days of 2024** according to the specifications in **God's calendar** (see Leviticus 23). This is a purely **astronomical calendar** in which the first day of the month always begins with the first visible crescent moon over Jerusalem, i.e. with the so-called <u>new light</u>. The Jewish calendar according to Hillel, which is used in Israel today, was invented very late by rabbis, namely in the 4th century AD, when the Israelites, who were scattered all over the world, could no longer see the first crescent moon over Jerusalem, but wanted to celebrate the same festivals together worldwide. The Jewish calendar is based on statistical averages, whereby the first crescent moon is no longer actually seen, but only mathematically assumed. This explains why some months in the Jewish calendar begin with an invisible crescent moon (new moon), which is absolutely impossible in God's calendar. In some years, the festivals in God's calendar can deviate from the Jewish calendar not only by 1-3 days, but in leap years (such as 2024) even by a whole month. See <u>Differences between the biblical and the Jewish calendar</u>.

In 2020 and 2023, the first 3 feast days (High Sabbaths; annual Sabbaths) fell on the same days of the week in both calendars; so the counting of the 50 days to Pentecost can be easily viewed in any Jewish online calendar in 2020 / 2023. But in 2024, the Jewish calendar has added an extra 13th month as a leap month at the wrong time, so all the feast days (which are supposed to be times of gathering with God) are celebrated a month too late. The Israelites therefore do not gather with the God of the Bible, but with themselves or with another god. Starting the year and the feast days so late is completely wrong from a biblical point of view, as can be easily proven by 3 facts:

- 1. The firstfruits sheaf is not there: the firstfruits sheaf of the early grain barley could not have been offered as a wave offering in the Jerusalem temple on Nisan 16 (in the first month of the year) because the overripe barley grains would have already fallen to the ground at the end of April. The firstfruits sheaf has great symbolic significance, as it represents the firstfruits of Jesus Christ. Only after the wave offering (symbolizing the resurrection and rapture of Jesus) had been solemnly offered in the temple was the barley harvest allowed to begin on Passover. But please look at the land of Israel, on April 24, 2024 (16th Nisan in the Jewish calendar) there will be no more barley in the fields, clear proof that the Jewish calendar has major errors. See Israel harvest times.
- 2. There is no connection to the equinox: The biblical spring and autumn feast days are always in the area of the spring equinox (March 19-21) and autumn equinox (September 22-24). But in the Jewish calendar, the festivals in 2024 begin a whole month later. This means that all 7 feast days (all 7 High Sabbaths) are celebrated far too late and that the connection to nature and the harvest times is lost not only at the time of barley (first sheaf), but throughout the year. As a result, the symbolic meaning between the harvest of fruit and the spiritual harvest of people in God's plan at the time of the biblical feast days of Pentecost (summer, wheat) and the Feast of Tabernacles (autumn fruit) would be completely lost.
- 3. **Dead high priest:** Of course, the high priest would die if he entered the Holy of Holies in the Jerusalem Temple a month late on a false Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement). God Himself ordained that the first day of the month always begins when the first crescent moon is visible over Jerusalem, and God established the ripeness of the early barley grain as the criterion for determining the first month of the year. This meant that the Israelites could celebrate all 7 annual High Sabbaths (feasts), which fall on different days of the week, at the right time every year and not have any disputes. But in the 2024 Jewish calendar, all 7 High Sabbaths are in the wrong month. The death of the high priest would have made their disobedience clear to the Israelites, as well as to all Christians who do not follow God's calendar but the manmade Jewish calendar.

The **lunisolar calendar of God** mentioned in the Bible is sensational because it combines all the months with the exact phases of the moon and the development of plants (nature, agriculture) throughout the year into a harmonious unity. The biblical spring and fall festivals are always in the area of the equinox (March 19-21 and September 22-24). The harvest times for the feasts symbolize the course of the spiritual harvest of the different groups of people in God's 7,000-year plan. Jesus Christ begins as the firstfruits with His resurrection on Nisan 17 (after 3 days and 3 nights). The next spiritual harvest (spring to summer harvest at Pentecost) are the firstfruits (the bride of Christ); they are the first called, who have love and follow the Lamb (Jesus) wherever He goes and who have separated themselves from the sins and habits of the world. They will be raptured. The main harvest in autumn with the last 4 feast days (High Sabbaths) symbolizes the great spiritual harvest of the other groups of people who lived in the first 6,000 years and in the Millennium (Rev 20:1-6). After the 6,000 years, they will appear before the throne of God at the time of the last judgment and be judged according to their works (Rev 20:1-15).

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The biblical month always begins at the so-called new light (first visible crescent moon over Jerusalem) and has either 29 or 30 days

The new light over Jerusalem and the beginning of the month 2024

Determining the beginnings of the months based on the first visible crescent moon (<u>new light</u>) over Jerusalem (see <u>timeanddate.com</u>) according to God's biblical calendar: The inaccurate Jewish calendar from the 4th century AD used in Israel today inserted an additional leap month at the beginning of 2024, which is a major error. As a result, the feast days in the Jewish calendar each begin one month later. This means that the connection between the feast days and the equinox and harvest times is lost. The following dates therefore only refer to the beginnings of the months in God's calendar. As can be clearly seen, <u>TorahCalendar</u> has correctly determined all the months of 2024. In order to see a very narrow crescent moon with the eye, a minimum illumination of 3 to 5 percent of the moon is required:

1st month Nisan **2024 (5784)**: March 11 (1.8%), March 12 (6.6%); **2**nd month Ijjar: April 9 (0.7%), April 10 (4.2%), April 11 (10.4%); **3rd month Siwan 2024**: May 9 (2.4%), May 10 (7.3%); **5th month Av**: July 7 (2.6%), July 8 (6.8%); **7th month Tishri 2024 (5784)**: Sept 4 (1.7%), Sept 5 (5.1%; Day of Trumpets), Sept 6 (10.2%).

In 2025: 1st month Nisan 2025 (5785): March 30 (1.5%), March 31 (6.2%); 3rd month Siwan 2025 (5785): May 28 (2.8%), May 29 (8.1%); 7th month Tishri 2025 (5786): Sept 23 (2.5%), Sept 24 (6.6%; Day of Trumpets).



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
ADDITIONAL FEAST DAYS IN ISRAEL 2025-2025

In addition to the 7 annual Sabbaths or High Sabbaths (feasts), which were ordered by God as early as the time of Moses, there are other feast days in Israel that came into being over the following centuries as a result of special historical events. The most important are **Tisha B'Av** (Day of Great Mourning) on the 9th of Av in the 5th month of the biblical year and **Tu B'Av** (Day of Joy, Festival of Marriage) on the 15th of Av. On this night of the full moon (14/15 Av), the virgins of Israel went to the vineyards to find a bridegroom while singing and dancing. It was the end of the wheat harvest and the end of the Pentecost season, as the harvest of the fall fruits (grape harvest) began at this time. The **Purim festival** (Day of Joy, Festival of Lots, Festival of Salvation) is at the end of a biblical year, i.e. in the 12th or 13th month (leap year).



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

The table above shows the 7 feast days (High Sabbaths) according to the biblical astronomical calendar of God (e.g. TorahCalendar) and the inaccurate mathematical Jewish calendar (italics). In 2020, both calendars fell on the same days. In some years there are big differences, because the leap years (red) with an additional 13th month in the Jewish calendar are often not calculated correctly (2021, 2024, 2027, 2030). In God's calendar, the spring and fall feasts are always near the equinox (March 19-21 and September 22-24), but in the Jewish calendar they are often a month later. God's calendar, described in Leviticus 23, is an astronomical and agricultural calendar in which the ripeness of the early grain (barley) determines the beginning of the first month of the year, so that the firstfruits sheaf (Omer) can always be offered on Passover.

In 2020, 2023, 2026, 2027, and 2030, the 14th of Nisan falls on a Wednesday in the Jewish calendar, as it did in the year Jesus was crucified.
